If you're buying this 4K collection just for movies, you won't be disappointed. It is the best way to watch and listen to movies. They look great and sound even better. However, I was surprised when I opened the box to see only 16 discs, for the 4K edition and 8 for the Blu-Ray edition. When you buy the 4K movies separately, you get an additional 3rd disc with all the extras. This disc 3 is not included with any of the films in this collection. This collection does not include any extras other than one from each Blu-ray release; movie experience. I previously had the Blu Ray Ultimate editions and was really disappointedDocuments found in this collection are nowhere to be found. No extra scenes. Nothing. In addition, the previous extended versions of Philosopher's Stone and Chamber of Secrets are only available on Blu-ray. The 4k disc contains only the theatrical version. PaceFirst, Confession: I'm by no means a Potter fan, so I felt a bit cheated sneaking into the Goblet of Fire media show while many true fans had to wait. So far, my interest in the series has consisted of sitting through the first film in a frozen theater, wondering what all the fuss is about, and flipping through the second book on the plane to satisfy my curiosity about the young wizard's charms. I've long been amazed at the sheer scale of Rowling's accomplishments, and while I treat many of my fellow travelers — regressive thirty-somethings wallowing in their childhood romances on the subway — with almost disdain, I know her success is well deserved. Still, it's a little over the top and honest enough to make any impoverished wannabe writer sigh with jealousy. As an

outsider who will no doubt get all the names wrong. I won't go into too much detail here, except that it revolves around the Triwizard Tournament, an epic and dangerous event that threatens to splinter Hogwarts loyalties. Instead I'll focus on the performances and first I have to admit that I have my doubts about the choice of Harry. Daniel Radcliffe looked like an inspired candidate after the first film - flowing hair, glasses and utter charm - but I'm afraid to say he's an ordinary actor. The trouble with hiring an 11-year-old for such a big film project is that when you're a teenager you're pretty much on your knees. It's like admiring a little puppy and getting terribly upset a year later when a freaking beautiful German shepherd trashed your living room and urinated on the carpet. Much better are his true friends. Rubber-faced Ron (Rupert Grint) is far more confident in handling teenage grunts than Radcliffe, and he says a lot of "hell" too, which caused some of the younger viewers around me to gasp with delight. There's plenty of harmony between him and the still skinny and dapper Hermione turned bloated English Rose, and the theme of teenage angst runs deep through the superb supporting cast, and it seems that Harry is much more comfortable dodging fire-breathing dragons than tiptoeing around the opposite sex. Growing pains are expertly managed by director Mike Newell, who is no stranger to the clumsy whims of a young love's daydreams after his excellent work on *Four Weddings and a Funeral*. Newell's penchant for the bittersweet trappings of comedy and romance. And, of course, the adults in the cast ride in a big way, inspired by their teenage counterparts. Hagrid, played by Robbie Coltrane, plots an unlikely affair with a giantess, played by Frances De La Tour; Michael Gambon - cheeky Dumbledore and Gary Oldman's screen time is limited to one scene where he sticks his head into the burning embers of a roaring fire to give Harry sage advice. Maybe they should have just hired a stuntman and saved on his fee. Most impressive is Ralph Fiennes, who is truly terrible as the evil Lord Voldemort. Fiennes' evil is handily aided by sneaky sneaky Timothy Spall, as well as the most terrifying nostrils gracing the screen since Hannibal Lector bent his snout at Agent Starling in *The Silence of the Lambs*. It's pretty unsettling stuff - visually unique in places - and pretty fast paced. The Potterfiles will love it and the critics will just get stuck down their throats.
